Turnstone had a good breeding season July 2018, and so we would have expected to have good numbers of juveniles overwintering here. But only low numbers were counted in our July Shorebirds 2020 count. But then, on 7th August (too late to be used for population monitoring), Helen and I had 25 at the Cape Banks Lighthouse and 50 in Gerloff Bay. 13 flags read, including 2 with Orange/Blue of King Island. Interestingly, one was aged 2 at the time of banding on 10.4.2019 at Nene Valley. Clive had added a note on the data sheet – very definitely NOT a juv. Then, on 5th September, we had 50 at Gerloff Bay, 25 at Kyms and scattered small numbers giving a final total of 91. Overwintering youngsters, or had adults started to arrive? Visibility was very poor, but I thought I could detect the washed out colouring of feathers faded by long hours of artic sunshine. And the one new flag that I read seemed to confirm this - USH was banded as an adult 10.4.2019, also at Nene Valley.

Beach Nesting Birds

Meanwhile, in the South East of South Australia the gales continue. Out on the beach in the Carpenter Rocks / Nene Valley area on Thurs the 5th Sept we only sited one pair, and they were just feeding. The earliest hoodies nest I recall on a SE beach was 9th September, at Woolwash – already with 3 eggs. The weather has been so inclement that this site has not

been checked yet but Jeff hopes to get there sometime next week. I advisedly said 'beach', as the earliest nest for the season is often in late August, on a cliff top in Canunda.

And, it should go without saying now - where-ever possible nests considered vulnerable are to be fenced. Everyone is asked to report any breeding activity to Jeff (with me copied in) as soon as possible after the sighting. This includes actual breeding and signs of potential breeding. We also keep a register of breeding activity. So please, report anything you see.

Last year we had lots of reports of Banded Lapwing during August. This year I have seen, and heard, nothing! There aren't as many ploughed paddocks in the Kongorong / Tantanoola area as there was last year, but maybe near you?
